Tea Loaf “Technical Challenge”- see Cookery Section

(Old Moir Family recipe, let Lance know what you think of it)

The following ingredients must be used:

- 6 oz mixed dried fruit of your choice, roughly chopped where appropriate
 - 4 oz brown sugar
 - 7½ fl oz cold strong tea or herbal tea of your choice
 - 8 oz self raising flour
 - 1 egg
1. Mix together dried fruit, brown sugar and tea and soak overnight
 2. Add the egg and flour
 3. Put mixture into a prepared small loaf tin
 4. Bake

GENERAL RULES

Each Exhibitor will be allocated a number on arrival at the Hall and given some stickers. Exhibitors will write their number on the sticker and put the sticker on their entry where it can be clearly seen.

1. All classes are open to children.
2. A sticker with the Exhibitor's allocated number on must be firmly placed in a visible location on each Exhibit.
3. Exhibitors are only allowed one entry in each class.
4. Entries in Vegetables, Fruit, Flowers and Flower Arrangements must have been grown by the Exhibitor. No varieties may be bought-in.
5. All entries in Cookery must be made by the Exhibitor and should be in sealed jars/bottles or covered in cling film.
6. Exhibitors must provide plates, dishes, pots, bottle, vases, etc. These should be marked with the Exhibitor's name (underneath so not visible to the Judges). *Plates etc should be no larger than necessary to ensure there is enough room on the tables for all exhibits. Vases for flowers must be stable in a breeze as the Hall doors are often open.*
7. All exhibits must be brought to the Hall between 8.30am and 10am on the day of the Show. Exhibits must be staged by 10.30am when the Hall will be cleared for judging.
8. The Judges may move a wrongly entered exhibit to a more appropriate class
9. The decision of the Judges is final.
10. Where there is a points tie for Section Trophies the Exhibitor with the most Firsts in that Section will be awarded the Trophy.
11. No exhibit is to be removed before 4pm on the day of the Show. All exhibits will be auctioned for charity, except those removed by 4.15pm.
12. The Show committee, whose decision shall be final, will settle matters for which these rules and schedule do not provide. The rules will be interpreted to encourage an inclusive Show.

Entry fees

There are no entry fees, but donations and the raffle are essential for running the Show, and the surplus will be donated to the charity named on the front cover.
